It is heartening to know that the Odisha Forestry Sector Development Project has been extended by two years and has started the consolidation works for sustainability of its initiatives beyond the Project period. The project has supported 2376 VSSs for execution of major interventions in JFM mode in 11 Forest Divisions and 52 EDCs in Wild Life Divisions. I expect that our field functionaries and VSS must have achieved the plantation targets, planned for the year.

Enhancing the capacity of communities participating in Joint Forest Management activities is one of the main focuses of the Project. It is learnt that the Project has engaged Capacity Building Support Agencies (CBSA) for VSS / EDC members to equip them with desired knowledge / skill in technical, institutional and financial aspects for consolidation and sustaining VSS/EDC as empowered village institution for democratic and scientific forest resource governance. Similarly, Income Generating Activity Support Agencies (IGASAs) have been continuing for their support for capacity building, hand holding, skill trainings, clustering and market linkages for the SHGs so as to improve their economic condition.

I am sure that with active involvement of all stakeholders, the OFSDP will achieve its objectives and goals and the learning thereof can be used for wider replication across the State on a sustained basis.

DEO's conference 2012



The State Level Conference of Divisional Forest Officers was organized at State Secretariat on 17th & 18th August, 2012. The Conference was inaugurated by Shri Bijoyshree Routray, Hon'ble Minister, Forest & Environment. The Conference was attended by all Divisional Forests Officers, all Senior Forest Officers of the Department, Forest Corporation and the Senior Forest Officers in other Departments. The Conference was conducted by Shri R.K Sharma, IAS, Principal Secretary to Government, Forest & Environment Department, Shrl P.N. Padhi, IFS, PCCF, Odisha, Shri K. Jude Sekhar, IFS, PCCF (KL), Odisha, Shri J.D Sharma, IFS, PCCF (WL) & CWLW, Odisha, & Shri Vinod Kumar, IFS, Project Director, Odisha Forestry Sector Development Project. On the occasion, the Hon'ble Minister released OFSDP booklet on 'OFSDP Highlights..... towards sustainability', launched 'Web GIS' and the new logo of the Odisha Forest Development Corporation Limited.

Issues related to all departmental activities from all wings of the Department were discussed in the conference. Practical field bottlenecks for implementation of MGNREGS were also discussed in presence of the Director, Panchayati Raj Dept. On OFSDP, the Project Director, OFSDP made a presentation on Implementation of different project activities and highlighted the issues concerning forestry sector vis a vis project progress. Following decisions were taken on deliberations for the project:

- (a) All project divisions were requested to identify suitable area for AR teak.
- (b) The RCCF, Baripada was requested to examine the issues concerning implementation of approved Casuarina harvesting and replanting scheme of Balasore & Bhadrak and to submit details of harvesting of 300 ha and replanting along with GPS details within 30th September, 2012.
- (c) DFO cum DMU Chiefs of Project Divisions having PA and issues of human-animal conflict were also requested to develop eco-development plan with EDC having proposals for Solar Power Fencings for mitigating Human Animal conflicts; excavation of small ponds for habitat management.
- (d) All DFOs (T,WL, KL) were requested to share their innovative approach/ success stories with photographs for publication in the OFSDP News Letter (Quarterly) for dissemination.



GOING GREEN

With the onset of monsoon, plantation activities with restoration of degraded forests on JFM (5th batch) sites over 11,480 ha, mangroves sites in JFM mode over 253 ha, Non JFM Teak plantation sites over 1,360 ha and Casuarinas sites over 49 ha have been taken up in 10 Divisional Management Units of Angul, Balliguda, Bonai, Jeypore, Koraput, Phulbani, Rayagada, Rourkela, Balasore WL & Bhadrak WL. These sites had been identified in 2011 for silvicultural works & pre-planting activities till plantations. Simultaneously, replacement of casualties in the plantations raised in earlier years were also taken up by all 11 Forest Divisions implementing OFSDP.

Mass Plantation:

Mass Plantation Programme by OFSDP Divisions was organized this year also along with all Forest Divisions of the State on 07th July, 2012. The Forest Department over 5 years to create awareness and to sensitize the people on tree plantation with its impact on amelioration of environment and reduction of global warming has been conducting mass plantations on a single day by involving

people from all walks of life in all Forest Ranges.

10 Districts

Parlakhemundi Division on the the occasion planted 96,000 seedlings of tree species i.e. Acaccia, Chakunda, Gambhar, Amla, Badachakunda, Kadamba, Cashew, Karanja, Mango, Jackfruit, Teak, Sissoo & Sunari in 07 FMU curn Ranges. Apart from this, awareness activities, free distribution of seedlings, quiz competition

amongst school students and plantation by different line departments were also organized.

At Jeypore DMU, local Panchayati Raj members, Journalists, Academicians, learned people, NGOs, Schools and College students, VSS members and other departments' staff participated & planted on the day in Borigumma, Boipariguda, Gupteswar, Jeypore, Kotpada and Kundra FMU cum Ranges. Awareness programme like mass rally, campaign, meetings were organized to spread the message among all categories of people about the

importance of forest, different livelihood based afforestation programme and plantation works. Further, junior and senior level debate and painting competition had also been organized among school students and prizes were distributed to successful competitors.



Eco – Clubs of Govt High Schools of Jeypore, Narapader, Bagra & Mundiguda took up plantation inside their school campus.

At Phulbani Forest Division, mass Plantation was observed in all



most all seven FMU cum Ranges of Phulbani Forest Division on 7th July 2012. Local stakeholders along with FMU staffs were engaged in mass plantation. In Phulbani Range, the mass

plantation work was held at Garakumpa village having VSS implementing OFSDP from 2nd phase. Total planting area was 17ha. Before taking the area into mass planting of different species, the land was lying barren and the site was selected with preparation for the day of Mass plantation to give it a new look for productive purpose. Total 27,200 tree seedlings of Teak (10,000), Chakunda(5,200), Karanja(6,000) and Simaruba(6000) were planted on this date. On the day of mass plantation, a mega

meeting was organised at the plantation site to create awareness about degradation of forest and its impact on the environment, for livelihood of the people and, on benefits of plantation. DFO, Phulbani, SP of Kandhamai district, Local MLA, Block Chairman, Zilla Parishad member, Sarpanch of Khajuripada panchayat, Ward member of Garakumpa were attraction of the meeting. The villagers of neighbouring Jhagadapata VSS and R.Nuagaon, students from R. Nuagaon High School & Garakumpa U.P. School participated both in the meeting and in planting of seedlings. This was one of the successful mass plantation programme in the division with peoples participation.

Vana mahostav was celebrated in all ranges of Rayagada forest

Division. Total 1, 31,287 saplings were planted in the week. In Rayagada range 24,580, Tikiri 18150, Kashipur 92, Gunupur 16655, Gudari 18400, Muniguda 16410 and in K Singhpur 37000 saplings were planted by department, other public offices, Schools & Colleges, Clubs & Samitis.



PONDIKOTE VSS IN NABARANGPUR FOREST DIVISION

Pondikote is a tribal village, located at 7 Km from Papadahandi. The village constitutes of about 80% tribals, 15% schedule caste and 5% of other caste. The poverty and short term livelihood urgency on exploiting neighbouring good forests over two decades accentuated the deterioration of the natural forest. Vast tracks of the

forest areas in Baghsargi RF and

Phatakote RL were encroached for cultivation of short duration crops. This unplanned exploitation gained momentum and the forest cover lost its vigour and was decimated to shrubby forest.

However, some villagers with farsightedness gathered courage to motivate the hackers to desist from the pernicious habit of destroying natural wealth. About 8 years back the villagers realized the follies and came to a common platform to protect the neighbouring forest areas. They protected the forest and refrain

other villages from damaging their protected areas. The endeavour of the villagers caught the attention of the Forest Division six years back. The Vana Sanrakshyana Sammittee (VSS) was constituted in the village on 20.01.2003. The VSS also unanimously resolved to plant encroached areas in Baghasargi RF and Phatakote RL adjoining Pandikote village along with protection of existing natural growth. The villagers evinced interest in plantation activities and willingly declared to evict the encroached areas for a common cause.

Nabarangpur Forest Division raised plantation in the years 2003-04, 2004-05, 2005-06, 2006-07, 2008-09 & 2009-10 over 30 ha, 35 ha, 45 ha, 20 ha, 25 ha, and 70 ha respectively. These plantations are being looked after by the villagers and "Thengapall" is being practised in the village for contributory protection. All the plantations have been successfully established. The endeavour of the villagers, which started in a modest way, has caught up with the time and the present achievement is laudable and praise worthy. All out effort is being made to support the cause of the villagers in disseminating the Ideas of Joint Forest Management.

Science Express BIODIVERSITY SPECIAL



Special train decorated as "Science Express-Biodiversity Special" in 2012 had been launched by Ministry of Environment & Forests, Govt. of India from Delhi station on 9th April 2012. The Special Train and activities of awareness with participation along the train route was precursor to the 11th Conference of the Parties (COP-11) to the Convention of Biological Diversity (CBD) held in Hyderabad from 01-19 October, 2012 to be attended by over 170 countries.

This special train moved through Odisha in the month of July 2012 and halted for days on 4 Railway Stations at Rourkela, Sambalpur, Cuttack and Berhampur for public viewing and participation. From our State, biodiversity conservation practices had been exhibited in the train under the theme of "Deccan" & "Coastal and Islands".

This special train was having 8 coaches decorated under different themes like, Biodiversity (Generic), Himalayas, Deserts (also include arid, semi arid and dry hub humid areas), Gangetic Plains, Western Ghats, Deccan, North East Region, Coastal & Islands. Some of the biogeographic zones had been clubbed under one theme due to similarity in biodiversity. Besides, activities like Panel discussions, Film show, Philately exhibition and competitions were taken up on the platform of the halting stations. Large number of students from schools and colleges visited the express.



Capacity Building Activities

Capacity Building is a focused activity of OFSDP, which aims at enhancing the capacity of Forest Department staff, VSS/EDC members, SHG groups and the community at large which in turn helps in improving their forest cover and in minimizing dependence of forest for livelihood. Regular trainings are being organized through project at Divisions for all the stake holders. Topics of trainings are identified and details formulated with current assessment, project learnings as well as emerging needs.

Under the project till September 2012, one hundred eleven trainings have been organized by the PMU and 1,236 Field Officers have been trained. 38 Officers have been sent abroad to get improvised skills and

knowledge on application of different modern techniques on forestry, wild life and blodiversity management. Important trainings Imparted through PMU are Nursery Techniques, Micro planning, Need based SMC in Forest areas, Ecotourism management, Micro finance and Micro enterprise, Root trainer nurseries, NTFP management, Sustainable management of natural forests, Enforcement of Wildlife Act and intelligence gathering, Positive Attitudinal Changes, Bamboo management, Total Quality Management, Forest Genetics and Tree Breeding, Result Based Management and others.

Capacity Building through CBSA

Project during 2012 has engaged Capacity Building Support Agencies (CBSA) at each Divisional Management Units for VSS/EDC to equip them with desired level of knowledge/skill in technical, institutional and financial aspects for consolidation of OFSDP programmes upto 2015 and for sustainability of VSS/EDC beyond 2015 as empowered village institution for community development with forest resource management at local level. This has provided impetus to capacity building of Executive Body members of VSS & EDC and their identified working group members. Between March 2012 and September, 2012, total number of persons trained on one or more of 6 designed training modules are 10,204. The different modules of trainings are:


Income Generation Activities (IGAs)

Odisha Forestry Sector Development Project supports for various capacity building programees in enhancing the Income Generation Activities (IGAs) mainly of Forest dependent communities for augmenting alternative livelihood options. Most of the trainings are imparted to SHG members of VSS/EDC, who undertake the IGAs. By September 2012, above 5,400 SHGs involved with IGA process in 2,200 VSS & EDC have been associated with Project. The specialized IGA Support Agencies (IGASA) are engaged by the project for SHG's business plan development, capacity building thereon, for handholding process and market linkages for promotion of IGAs. Simultaneously, the EC members as well as the



Project staffs are also being trained so that they would also facilitate SHG in business of the IGAs. Following categories of the training programmes have been carried out through IGASA at each Divisional Management Unit:
